Guido M. Pichini '74 was awarded an honorary doctor of humane letters degree during the presidential inauguration of Dr. Kenneth Hawkinson. Pichini recently finished his fifth consecutive term as chairman of the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education Board of Governors. He is the first State System university alumnus to chair the board that oversees the State System. He also is a member of the Kutztown University Council of Trustees. KU FIELD HOCKEY HOLDS HIGHEST GPA IN DIVISION II



Members of the KU field hockey team were honored by the university's Council of Trustees for their achievement.

The Kutztown University field hockey team was honored by the university's Council of Trustees ${\rm for}$

earning the top grade point average among all Division II programs. KU earned a GPA of 3.54 in the fall. The team was originally recognized by the National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) in March as one of 27 schools in the country to earn a National Academic Team Award.

Kutztown's top GPA in Division II is its highest since earning the No. 2 honor in 2011. Its last No. 1 honor came in

2008. It is the 12th consecutive year that Kutztown has been recognized with a Team Award. The National Academic Team Award recognizes those institutions that achieved a minimum Team GPA of 3.0 during the first semester of the 2015-16 academic year.

Kutztown also led Division II with six NFHCA Scholars of Distinction (GPA of 3.90 or higher). Sixteen Golden Bears held a cumulative GPA of 3.30 or higher through the fall semester to be named to the NFHCA National Academic Squad.



STEINBERG EARNS FULBRIGHT AWARD

Joshua Steinberg of Huntingdon Valley, Pa., won a Fulbright English Teaching Assistantship (ETA) grant to travel to Germany for the 2016-2017 academic year. Steinberg graduated from Kutztown University in December. The ETA program places Fulbright Scholars in classrooms abroad to provide assistance to local English teachers. Assistants in this program help teach the English language while serving as cultural ambassadors for the United States. The age and academic level of their students vary by country and range from kindergarten to university level. Steinberg has a bachelor's degree in philosophy and graduated summa cum laude. He is also pursuing a master's degree in philosophy with a teaching assistantship at Texas Tech University upon his return from Germany.



BARON HONORED BY AMERICAN RED CROSS






Having worked as an emergency medical technician during the summer, he took immediate action, administering emergency medical care until University Police and the local EMS team arrived.

In addition, due to his knowledge as an EMT, Baron made recommendations to the university administration to enhance resources for similar incidents in the future. For his actions, Baron received the KU President's Citation earlier this year.

2016 ANNUAL ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS

Kutztown University celebrated the recipients of its annual Academic Achievement Awards in April. The award was established through a donation provided by Dr. Carlson R. Chambliss, professor emeritus, physical sciences and KU faculty member from 1970–2003. The purpose of the awards is to recognize the exceptional individual achievements of a select group of KU graduating seniors. Specially designed coin medallions of gold, silver and copper were presented to the students.

GOLD MEDAL RECIPIENTS

David Grow, York, Pa., graduated with a degree in environmental science/biology. Grow received the Gold Chambliss Student Academic Achievement Award 2016 in the category of successfully completed research projects. Grow's research has included documenting the location and size of invasive plant populations along hundreds of miles of the Appalachian National Scenic Trail in Pennsylvania and providing management and sustainable stewardship information to the Appalachian Trail Conservancy and the National Parks Service, among others. He has presented his research at KU, a regional conference and a national ecological conference and is preparing a manuscript for publication. He received the Carole and Ray Neag Undergraduate Research Fund Grant to present his research at the 100th Annual Ecological Society of America Conference, the KU Promise Scholarship and an Eagle Scouts scholarship. He is a member of the KU Biology Mentoring Program and the KU Outdoors Club, and has been a member of the Dean's List for every semester of his time at KU. Grow has secured a graduate student position at Towson University, with an ultimate goal to secure a faculty position as an ecologist or conservation biologist.

ZAYAITZ NAMED PROVOST AND VICE PRESIDENT FOR ACADEMIC AFFAIRS

Dr. Anne Zayaitz has been named provost and vice president for academic affairs at Kutztown University. Zayaitz, who will serve as the university's chief academic officer and as a member of the president's cabinet, will be second-in-command for the institution. Her position serves as the main advocate for student success and the pursuit of academic excellence, with oversight of educational, scholarly service and research

graduate, graduate and doctoral programs.

Zayaitz served as acting provost and vice president of academic and student affairs since March 2015. During that period, the university secured five accreditations and announced its first two doctoral programs. Three new minor programs and one certification were added this spring, and 11 new programs, including four bachelor's and two master's programs, will debut in the fall.

Zayaitz has been a member of the Kutztown University community since 1985, when she joined the faculty in the Department of Biology. She taught various biology courses at KU for 14 years, advancing to associate professor. During that period, Zayaitz regularly advised more than 70 students, helped secured more than \$300,000 in grants, and served as the university ombudsperson.

"I am very excited to join the president's cabinet as provost and vice president for academic affairs," Zayaitz said. "I look forward to continuing my work with the very dedicated, caring and talented faculty and staff at the university, as well as working with Dr. Hawkinson to ensure student success."

Zayaitz has served on many committees at KU through the years, including chair of the new vice president for enrollment management and student affairs search, Women's Center Advisory Board, Commission on Human Diversity and the University Safety Committee. She was an advisor to the Best Buddies student organization.

In the community, Zayaitz is the president of East Penn Neighbors Helping Neighbors, a board member of the East Penn School District Education Foundation, and a volunteer at the Outley House Shelter for Men in Philadelphia, Pa. Zayaitz earned her Ph.D. in food microbiology with a minor in nutrition and economics from Cornell University, Ithaca, N.Y. She earned her Master of Science from Cornell in food microbiology and her Bachelor of Arts from Duke University, Durham, N.C., in botany.

HILTON JOINS KU AS VICE PRESIDENT OF ENROLLMENT MANAGEMENT AND STUDENT AFFAIRS

Dr. Warren Hilton has been named vice president for enrollment management and student affairs at Kutztown University. Hilton will be responsible for all enrollment management activities and select student affairs programs in the newly restructured, cabinet-level position.

Hilton comes to KU from the Community College of Philadelphia (CCP), where he has served as dean

of enrollment management since August 2014. He is responsible for overseeing an enrollment management division that includes 110 employees and a multi-million dollar budget. He increased international student enrollment by 10 percent and maintained an overall stable enrollment for the college.

Prior to CCP, Hilton was the associate dean for student and external affairs at Drexel University in Philadelphia, where he served for more than five years. He was the senior student affairs, enrollment management, and external affairs officer for the School of Public Health. He revamped the orientation program to include student success components, managed the advising system, and increased first-year student enrollment by 20 percent.

He was promoted to associate dean from the role of assistant dean for student and external affairs (2011-13), and assistant dean for student affairs (2009-11).

Hilton worked at Moravian College in Bethlehem, Pa., from 2003 until 2009. He was the associate dean for student development from 2006-09. His responsibilities included the supervision of leadership development, student activities and orientation, community service, and career development. From 2003-06, he served as Moravian's director for career development. Hilton had stints early in his career as the assistant director for career development at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Md. (2001-03); academic advisor/evening administrator at Stevenson University in Stevenson, Md. (2002-03); volunteer career counselor/event planner at Baltimore Community College (2002-03); and course lecturer/career consultant at University of Maryland, College Park (1999-01). He has taught graduate higher education as well as health management and policy related coursework since 2011.

A native of Philadelphia, Hilton is a member of eight professional organizations and does extensive volunteer work. He has completed nearly 30 publications and presentations, has been a journal peer reviewer and has secured two major grants. Hilton earned his Doctor of Education in educational leadership and management from Drexel. He earned his Master of Arts in student affairs and Bachelor of Science in computer science with minor in economics from Indiana University of Pa.

TEITELBAUM NAMED DEAN OF COLLEGE OF EDUCATION



Dr. Kenneth Teitelbaum has been named dean for the College of Education at Kutztown University. He will be the chief executive of the college, comprising five departments: Special Education, Elementary Education, Secondary Education, Library and Learning Technologies, and Counseling and Student Affairs. Working closely with faculty and department chairs, Teitelbaum will set the strategic

objectives for the college and will lead the creation and implementation of programs and actions to realize them. He will also be responsible for implementing college and university policies, overseeing support services, addressing the needs of students, faculty and staff of the college, and will assist in attracting private support for the unit. The college offers degrees at the undergraduate and graduate levels, and recently announced the intent to offer a doctorate in transformational teaching and learning.

Teitelbaum comes to KU from University of North Carolina Wilmington, where he served as dean and professor for the Watson College of Education beginning in 2011.

Teitelbaum earned his Ph.D in curriculum and instruction with a minor in educational policy studies from University of Wisconsin at Madison. He earned his Master of Arts in Teaching from Cornell University in social studies education and his Bachelor of Arts from New York University in history with a minor in sociology.



NEWLY NAMED LIBRARY AND LEARNING TECHNOLOGIES REFLECTS ADVANCES IN LIBRARY SCIENCE


KU has announced changes to its former Library Science Department in an effort to enhance long-term growth of the program. The department's new name, Library and Learning Technologies, reflects exciting, new technological advances in the library field. The American Association of School Librarians and the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education currently accredit the department's programs. In addition, the department is pursuing accreditation by the American Library Association, which falls in line with overall university initiatives.

The Library and Learning Technologies program is currently accepting student applications at the undergraduate and graduate levels. In addition, the university is moving toward an increased online presence for delivery of the curriculum.

Currently, Kutztown is the only school in the Pa. State System of Higher Education that offers Pa. Department of Education certification as a school library media specialist on the undergraduate level, and one of two schools in the system that offers a public library program. Additionally, KU offers a master's program in library science and one in instructional technology, with crosslisted course options. The Library and Learning Technologies program also offers a master's level school library certification.

KU has offered a library science degree since 1921. The current program options have been redesigned to include the traditional roles of librarianship, as well as emerging learning technologies. Additionally, the program balances theoretical foundation with practical implementation.

The Principals Presidents OF KUTZTOWN UNIVERSITY



John S. Ermentrout

JOHN S. ERMENTROUT

Principal, Keystone State Normal School, 1866-1871

As superintendent of schools for Berks County, Ermentrout was instrumental in the placement of Keystone State Normal School at its current site. He laid the cornerstone for the original Old Main in 1865 when it was called Maxatawny Seminary. Ermentrout served as trustee and principal until

1871 when he returned to the pulpit as a local pastor. In 1873 he returned to KSNS as the chair of mental and moral science and English literature. He passed away in 1881.



Abraham R. Horne

ABRAHAM R. HORNE

Principal, Keystone State Normal School, 1872-1877

Born in 1834, Horne was known for preaching to other children and being an avid reader as a child. He began his teaching career at age 16 and by age 24 was serving as principal of Bucks County Normal and Classical School of Quakertown, Pa. He went on to serve as superintendent of schools


at Williamsport and in 1872 was elected principal of KSNS, where he led the school through a period of growth and pros-

perity until he left in 1877. Horne passed away in 1902.

NATHAN C. SCHAEFFER

Principal, Keystone State Normal School, 1877-1893

Born in 1849, Schaeffer was the first student to attend the Maxatawny Seminary, graduating in 1865. He went on to graduate from Franklin and Marshall College and returned to KSNS in 1871. Aside from brief interruptions to attend Mercersburg College and to study in Europe, Schaeffer spent



Amos C. Rothermel '86

AMOS C. ROTHERMEL '86 Principal, Keystone State Normal School, 1899-1928; President, Kutztown State Teachers College, 1928-1934

Born in 1864, Rothermel served longer than any other principal or president in Kutztown University history. He graduated from the school in 1886 and returned to KSNS as a professor of natural sciences in 1893 and rose to the rank of principal in 1899. He would lead the school through its transition to Kutztown State Teachers College when he became the first president in school history. He retired in 1934 after 43 years of service to his alma mater. He died in 1946.



Quincy A. W. Rohrbach '12

QUINCY A. W. ROHRBACH '12

President, Kutztown State Teachers College, 1934-1959

Rohrbach, a 1912 graduate of KSNS, was named president of the school in 1934 after spending ten years as an administrator at the University of Pittsburgh. He had the daunting task of guiding the college through the second half of the Great Depression and

World War II. Rohrbach was a member of the Pinchot Educational Commission during its 1931 and 1933 sessions. In 1959, the Pennsylvania General Assembly adopted his report, which urged changing the name and function of Pennsylvania's teachers colleges to the state college system used until 1983. He retired in 1959 and died in 1988 at the age of 94.



ITALO L. DEFRANCESCO

President, Kutztown State College, 1959-1967

Born in Borello, Italy, deFrancesco came to the U.S. in 1919. He was the first president of Kutztown State College, a position he held from 1959 until his death in 1967. He had been affiliated with Kutztown State College for 31 of his 45 years as an educator, mostly as director of art education. He was a


recognized authority on art and had taught at Reading Boys' High School prior to coming to Kutztown. In 1959, the National Art Education Association named him "Art Educator of the Year." He graduated from West Chester State College in 1922. He held degrees from West Chester University and the University of Pennsylvania. He received a doctorate in education from New York University in 1942.



CYRUS E. BEEKEY

President, Kutztown State College, 1967-1969

Beekey, a graduate of Albright College and Cornell University, came to Kutztown State College in 1943 as a professor of physics for the Army Air Corps, who were training on campus. He had previously taught in the Reading School District for 16 years. One year later he was named a professor of biology and chair of the science department. He also served as head of admissions and the dean of instruction. He was named president in 1967 and served until poor health forced him to retire in 1969. Beekey died in 1974.

Born in 1924, Dr. Lawrence M. Stratton received a bachelor's and a master's degree from the University of Michigan and a doctoral degree from Rutgers University. He served as president of Kutztown University from 1969 – 1987, guiding the institution

from a state college to university status. Stratton is noted for doubling the academic programs available at KU and growing the campus with the addition of the Beekey Education Center, the fine arts annex of Sharadin Arts Building, the administration building and Bonner, Lytle and Keystone Halls. Stratton died while still in office in 1987.

President, Kutztown University, 1988-2002

McFarland was president of Kutztown University from 1988 – 2002. He came to KU after serving as the provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University of Central Missouri. The Student Union Building was named in his honor in 2002. McFarland currently serves as a senior associate with the American Association of

State Colleges and Universities Penson Center for Professional Development.



F. Javier Cevallos

F. JAVIER CEVALLOS President, Kutztown University, 2002-2014

Cevallos was born in Cuenca, Ecuador, and later moved to the Caribbean Commonwealth of Puerto Rico. He holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Puerto Rico and master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Illinois. Cevallos spent the majority of his career as a professor of Spanish and

Portuguese, department chair and vice chancellor for student affairs at the University of Massachusetts. He was named president of KU in 2002 and served the university for 12 years. In June, 2014, Cevallos returned to Massachusetts as president of Framingham State University. KU

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former library technician at KU.

This spring Avalanche, KU's beloved Golden Bear mascot, won his second consecutive title as Mascot Madness Champion. Over the course of six weeks he took on all the mascots in the State System of Higher Education, winding up in the finals against Rocky from Slippery Rock, again. The race was heated and Avalanche pulled out a close win to keep his title.

Avalanche made his debut on campus in 2005 and has stolen the hearts of the entire KU community. But the history of mascots in Kutztown has not always been as warm and fuzzy.

A century ago, as athletics became more prominent, students, and the media, were unsure of what to call the players from Keystone State Normal School (KSNS). Teams were referred to as the "maroon and gold," "keys," "keystonians," "Kutztown teachers," "flying Dutchmen" and even "sauerkrautians."

KSNS teams were not known for providing many marks in the win column. After a 64-39 loss to Millersville in 1934, the men's basketball team was the first to be called the

Golden Avalanche. Harry Glover '35, then a reporter with the Keystone, used the name in jest in describing the dismal contest. The "golden" paid homage to the school's colors, but the "avalanche" referred to the KSNS teams habitually being "snowed under" by their opponents.

called for students to submit suggestions for a proper mascot. In November, 1948, the Keystone student much support.

In October, 1961, change finally came to Kutztown. The school had just been renamed Kutztown State College (KSC) and the Keystone staff once again made a plea to students to submit suggestions for a new name. They received entries such as the "eagles" and the "hilltoppers," but one name beat them all, "Golden Bears." The 1961 KSC football team was the first to use the new moniker during its season. Sue (Shaw) Langer '62 made the trip to a local department store in Reading and came back with enough furry material to construct the first mascot in the school's history.

A mascot commonly referred to as "Pooh Bear" carried the school into the 1980s when it became Kutztown University. In 1999, Erin Blank '91 created a duo of characters known as Goldie and Griz, who would lead

BACK TO CLASS WITH ...

KATHLEEN DOLGOS 68, M'71

For Kathleen Dolgos of Wescosville, retirement definitely does not mean resting on her laurels.

During her tenure at Kutztown University (KU), she was certainly active. Dolgos spent 12 years as chair of the Secondary Education Department, and a year as interim chair of Elementary Education. She was co-director of the study abroad program experiencing multiple trips to England, and two exchange visits with the Russian program, traveling to Moscow in 2003 and 2006.

But her connection to KU didn't start there.

In January 1968, Dolgos earned her Bachelor of Science in education with a concentration in mathematics from the Kutztown State Teachers College. Later, in 1971, she finished her Master of Education degree with a concentration in mathematics education. Before returning to instruct at her alma mater in 1991, she served as a high school math teacher at Allentown Central Catholic, and worked part-time as a professor at Muhlenberg College.

"I loved teaching where I went to college," recalls Dolgos. "I enjoyed seeing students walk down the hall with their KU sweatshirts on, remembering being a student myself. I loved seeing them be successful."

What does the former tenure and curriculum committee member not miss?

"Correcting research papers," she laughs, explaining she did a lot of it as a grad school professor.

CONTINUING TO GIVE BACK

Though the 2002 Arthur & Isabelle Wiesenberger Award-winning professor retired in 2013, Dolgos is still active in many ways, including within the field of education as a member of the board of trustees for the local charter school, Roberto Clemente Charter School of Allentown, which boasts both elementary and high school facilities.

"I love that it's a block away from where I grew up as a kid and that I can be involved in education and continue to give back," Dolgos, an Allentown native, says. "I feel like I know who the people in those neighborhoods are. I used to be them."

The other big project she's committed to is one she works on with her husband, George, a former missile technician on a nuclear submarine for the U.S. Navy. The two are co-chairs of Caps for Kids, an umbrella program under the Lehigh Valley Base of the United States Submarine Veterans, Inc.

The initiative sees members of the organization give submariner programs to children with medical challenges (often cancer) and present those kids with their own baseball caps adorned with dolphins, making them honorary submariners. The caps are particularly significant to those children with ailments causing hair loss. The program is well-known and established nationally, but Kathleen and George have headed the charge locally for about a year now.

ENJOYING HER FREE TIME

If there is one thing Dolgos enjoys more now in her retirement days, it's travel.

"I love that I have the freedom to go where I want, whenever I want and that I'm not tied to having to maneuver around school breaks," she says.

She and George just recently returned from a three-week riverboat cruise site-seeing in Belgium, Holland and Germany. Last year, they spent time on a cargo ship visiting Norway, traveling all the way to the Arctic Circle, Russia and back.

When considering future travel, she asserts she needs some time to recoup from her last jaunt, and get through her pile of mail. Not too long after she reveals, "I'm looking at Cuba as the next spot, possibly. I'll need a couple of weeks then I'll be able to say, 'Now where are we going?" Then Dolgos will start the trip-planning process again.

While home, she'll indulge in a couple of her other favorite pastimes: gardening and reading. She enjoys the time outdoors and her easy-to-maintain pets: her koi fish.

And she has at least three books to read by her favorite author: James Patterson. She's thankful he never seems to run out of writing fodder.

"I think he writes them [books] overnight," she laughs. Dolgos also enjoys spending time with her two daughters: Michele, 40, and Denise, 41, as well as her three grandchildren and grand-dogs.

STILL CONNECTED TO KU

Though Dolgos is officially retired, she still can't completely break ties with KU, the university she loves. As treasurer of the Retiree Union, she helps guide future retirees at the university on how to do it right.

Once yearly, near the end of the fall semester, she helps those attending retirement meetings think about what options they might want to consider when their retirement time comes. She, herself, started attending such meetings five years before she took the retirement plunge and highly recommends others take advantage of them as well – even if retirement is 20 years off – to get pointed in the right direction. KU
